There are new owners and managers at some local clubs and we also



One change this season is the Around the Clubs feature of local league and tournament results will now be made available online. This will keep the results more timely so please check our website for updates.







ohn Garvey, at age 94, teamed up with his son Mike to win the C Flight of the Senior Men's 2-Man Scramble at Legacy Ridge Golf Club last fall. Now, at age 95, he plans to play three times a week - as he did last season - and maybe enter some tournaments. The Legacy Ridge member shot his age several times last season with his best score being an 86 - shot on his son Mike's birthday. He grew up in Sandwich, Ontario (just outside of Windsor), joined the Canadian Merchant Marines at age 16 and served in World War II. When he returned from the war, he started playing ball and become so skilled he was recruited by a U.S. team. He came to Owen Sound in 1967 to help build the industrial furnace at the CPI glass factory, which later became PPG Industries. He stayed on at CPI after construction was complete and during his time in Owen Sound was an umpire at local ball games for 70 years and a hockey referee until he was 80. He took up golf in his 40s and now plans to play "as long as my legs will hold out."

Course part of \$1.5 billion resort

The Nest open every day for public play

t has been a long time - about 12 years, in fact - since
BruceGreySimcoe has had a new golf course open.
So it's exciting to see The Nest - a Doug Carrick design
on Lake Simcoe - open for its first full season. A soft opening
was held last season but now, with the clubhouse also open
for business, golfers can get the full experience.

The Nest is part of a \$1.5 billion 600-acre resort called Friday Harbour east of Barrie. The resort includes a 1,000-slip multiple canal docking area, boardwalk retail space and the master plan calls for up to 2,000 condos, townhouse, and hotel residences.

The golf course is semi-private and will be open for public play Monday to Thursday all day, before 11 a.m. on Fridays and after 1 p.m. on Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

The posted green fee rates (May 16-Sept. 30) are \$115 for 18 holes, \$60 for 9 holes and \$70 for Twilight (after 4 p.m.). For more information, go to fridayharbour.com





Greg's excellent adventure

Pike Lake pro tees it up with PGA Tour player, scores ace and catches a shark

reg Shaw's original plan last November was to drive to Florida, stay for a few nights then fly home. But his road trip turned into a 16-day adventure that saw him golfing with a PGA Tour pro, scoring his first ace and fishing for five days in the Florida Keys.

The head golf pro at Pike Lake Golf Centre was scheduled to drive his parent's vehicle to Florida and be accompanied by a buddy - Omar Basic - in a second vehicle owned by his parent's friends. Together, they were to deliver the vehicles and then fly home.

But his parent's friends weren't able to make it to Florida and some golfing and fishing opportunities developed so Greg and Omar decided to turn it into an extended vacation.

On the way down they stopped for three days at Olde Mill Resort in Laurel Fork, Virginia and Greg met up with two buddies from his days on the golf team at Concord University in Athens, West Virginia.

They joined the friends - Bo Goins, the pro at Olde Mille, and former Sylvan Lake, Alberta resident Graham Laird, the pro at Blue Ridge CC in Galax, Virginia - for 18 holes at Olde Mill and 36 at Cross Creek in Mount Airy, North Carolina.

Then it was off to Florida where they visited Greg's parents for a couple of days in Zephyrhills, and his wife's grandparents in Sun 'n Lakes in Sebring.

The next stop was Boynton Beach to play 18 holes with PGA Tour player David Hearn, who has been one of Greg's friends ever since their junior days together at Pike Lake.

"I had sent a text message to him to see if he would be available because we were headed to the Keys for fishing," Greg said. "He was very happy to accommodate us because we haven't played a round together in over 20 years. He was exactly the same guy I grew up playing with at Pike Lake. He treated us to a complete day. Warm-up session at the range, full day on the course with Omar as well. We then had lunch at the club and then back to his house to visit with his family."

The course was Pine Tree Golf Club in Boynton Beach, which Greg described as "unbelievable," and Hearn shot a

"smooth 68."

But playing with a tour pro wasn't the only golf excitement for Shaw as he scored his first ace earlier on the trip. His Callaway representative set up a round for him at Cypress Run Golf Club, a private course in Tarpon Springs, and he aced the 8th hole.

After getting lots of golf in, they headed to Islamarada in the Florida Keys for some fishing.

"A guy Omar works with has a place there so he was our tour guide. It's a complete fishing community with great restaurants," Shaw said.

"We went out on charters during the day and then did night fishing for sharks and tarpon off our dock at our rental condo. I was able to bring in a 4.5-foot nurse shark at midnight and Omar's best catch was a 4-foot barracuda. Amazing experience."



Housing planned for Homestead

Course to remain open but reconfiguration of holes planned for future

Ithough there are plans for a housing development at Homestead Resort near Durham, the golf course and restaurant will remain in operation.

The golf course property was sold earlier this year to H. Bye Construction, a business based in the Mount Forest area.

Under the terms of the partnership agreement, Jason Menaul will continue to operate the clubhouse restaurant and golf course for a minimum of five years.

Proceeds from the sale went to Jason's father Gary and Sharon Menaul, who had owned the resort for about 30 years.

The initial plan was for about 28 homes - many of them along Wilder Lake - on lots larger than one acre.

Plan approvals are needed before construction can begin.

As a result, the 5,508-yard golf course will remain 18 holes for the 2019 season and probably 2020 as well.

However, they are currently working on plans to reconfigure the course.



Housing will be developed along Wilder Lake and that will necessitate changes to the layout of Homestead Golf Course near Durham.

When the development goes ahead the resort will either be relocating the cabins by the lake or building some form of replacement lodging for guests.

And they will continue to offer Stay and Play packages.

Strong finish for Rachael

Hanover golfer moves on after successful year with record-breaking Davenport team

anover's Rachael Rier has made the tough decision to leave Davenport University in Grand Rapids, Michigan and her position on the women's golf team to pursue studies in Ontario.

"My program wasn't what I hoped it would be academic wise, and as hard as it was to make the decision, I know I have to put my academics first," she states in an email to Golf BruceGreySimcoe.

"I'm going to be completing my degree in golf management at Georgian College (in Barrie) while I play for the Grizzlies ladies team. It'll be nice to be closer to home and pursue a degree more focused on my passion."

She had been studying Sports Management at Davenport.

The transfer to Georgian comes after a record-breaking year for Rachael's Davenport team, which wrapped up its season with a runner-up finish in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Championship.

The Division II Panthers were ranked 102nd in the nation but made it to the final match play champion-ship against the 10th-ranked Grand Valley State. And while Davenport lost all five matches in the final, all of them were decided by three strokes or less.

Rier, who was 17th in the stroke play portion of the tourna-

ment, shot 80 in the finals and lost her match by just one shot.

In making it to the finals, the team set a 54-hole scoring record.

Coach Melanie Loughin was thrilled with the result.

"What an unbelievable weekend! We finished ninth in 2018 and second this year! Talk about improvement," she states in an article on the school's website.

"It's been our goal the entire year to make it to the medal match play. It feels so good to accomplish it. I'm beyond proud of this group."

For Rier, it was a strong finish to a great season with the team.

"My second year at Davenport was a huge success. I couldn't have asked for a better group of girls to play with, and I'm so happy we saw a little more success on the course this year. We actually broke every team record this year, so that's an accomplishment I'm so proud to have been a part of "

"I loved playing for Davenport, and I'm so grateful for the time I got to spend there, but I'm excited to see what the future holds for me at Georgian."

May 15 - Men's Mid-Am, Mad River Golf Club, Creemore


June 6 - Junior Boys, Blue Mountain Golf & Country Club near Collingwood

Celebrating life of Keith Stein

Event to pay tribute to golf course owner

riends and family will gather on June 15 to celebrate the life of Keith Stein, a long-time golf course owner in the area who died March 31 at age 80.

The celebration is scheduled from 2-4 p.m. at the Southampton Golf and Country Club where Keith was a member for many years. Originally from Wheatley, Ontario, he bought Whispering Hills Golf Club in 1972 and operated the Hanover-area club until 1977. He also owned Holiday Golf Club in Port Elgin from 1986 until January 2018.

He played his final round at Whispering Hills on his 80th birthday (May 27, 2018) with son Steve and Pike Lake's Herb Cowen, a lifelong friend in the golf business. Afterwards, a birthday celebration was held in the clubhouse lounge.

He remained close to the Day family after selling Whispering Hills to them in 1977. "He remained a great friend of the club and visited the club regularly and

supported many golf tournaments over the past 40 years. He will be very sadly missed by all of us at Whispering Hills Golf Club," the Day family stated shortly after his death.

All four of his sons followed him into the golf business. John is superintendent at Southampton Golf and Country Club, Steve is superintendent at Pike Lake, Keith is Director of Golf Course Operations at Cinnamon Hill and White Witch golf clubs in Montego Bay, Jamaica and Ken (K.J.) is assistant superintendent at Sleepy Hollow Golf and Country Club in Stouffville.

Keith Sr. worked as a baker in the family bakery before getting into the golf business and was a top-level athlete in many sports. The family says he will be fondly remembered for his love and promotion of the game of golf and will be missed for his fun spirit and youthful attitude.

New owners at Woodington

Immediate plans are to enhance the golf course and prepare for two big championships

Woodington Lake Golf Club near Tottenham was sold over the winter and the new owners have ambitious plans for the 400-acre property.

The new owners are Toronto-area businessmen Joseph Chetti and Vincent Salvatore, who purchased the 36-hole facility from Harry and Winnifred Allard, owners of the property since 1994.

Immediate plans are to enhance the golf course, including bunker refurbishment, in preparation for two big events this summer

The club has signed a five-year deal to play host to both the Ontario Open, a resurrected event with a rich history, and the first-ever Ontario Disability Championship.

The Disability Championship will take place Aug. 23-25 while the Ontario Open, a storied championship whose past champions include Sam Snead, Moe Norman and George Knudson, is set for Aug. 26-29.

Besides course improvements, the new owners are also looking at several ideas to enhance the overall facility, including the possibility of an outdoor amphitheatre to hold concerts and a public use building that could be set up for various functions, like a farmers' market or skating.

They have have also hired award-winning executive chef Ken Johnson from New York, who has more than 25 years of culinary experience.

Other new faces at the club are Domenic DiGironimo, who takes over as General Manager, and Phil Hidden, a CPGA professional who will be the Head Golf Professional and Pro Shop Manager.





Driving range upgrade, new superintendent

He is a certified IPM agent and provides proper use of chemical applications (fertilizers and pesticides) in compliance with the IPM program, can operate all golf equipment and is known for maintaining

exceptional playing conditions on a day-to-day basis.

"Al is passionate about turf and happiest when out on the course, working his magic and having fun at the same time," the club stated in his appointment notice.

Personally, he holds a First Degree Black Belt in Martial Arts, enjoys playing guitar, horticulture, loves the great outdoors and campfires at his home on Bruce Beach.

New Driving Range

Last fall the club began a new project on the driving range and work has continued this spring. They are moving the tee deck back to lengthen the entire driving range and hopefully prevent the loss of so many range balls through the end of the range. The other reason for doing this is to create one large and level teeing ground for everyone to enjoy.

The drainage and surface were prepared last fall and the irrigation and wiring was put in this spring.

The plan is to open the new driving range in the middle of May but golfers will be able to use the old front tee deck until it opens. The practice facility has been dedicated to course co-owner Taylor Candler's grandparents - Ron and Dahl Clarridge - who Taylor and her husband and co-owner Charles say have "supported us endlessly, loved us unconditionally, and cheered us on tirelessly from the very beginning."

It will now be known as the "Ron & Dahl Clarridge Driving Range at Ainsdale Golf Course."

Also joining the staff as an associate professional is Mark Hughes, who is originally from Scarborough but came to the area at age 12 when his parents moved to Sauble Beach.

He attended elementary school in Sauble and high school at West Hill in Owen Sound before enrolling in the Professional Golf Management Program at Georgian College in Barrie.

His first golf industry job was a college co-op placement at Bigwin Island Golf Club in the Muskokas, one of five top-50 golf courses in Canada where he has worked. The others are Westmount in Kitchener, Taboo in the Muskokas, Fairmount Banff Springs and Raven Golf Club at Lora Bay (now known as the Golf Club at Lora Bay).

His most recent positions were at Golf Town stores in Mississauga (Highway 401 and Mavis) and Milton and then Port Carling Golf and Country Club where he spent the past year as an associate professional.

Returning for his second year is associate professional Stephen Bardswick.

Not returning are pros Andrew Baines and Ryan Jackson. Baines, after 9 years at Cobble, is pursuing a career in real estate in the area and Jackson has moved on to an associate pro position with TPC Toronto at Osprey Valley.


House construction at the Port Elgin-area club is well underway with 26 townhomes in the first phase and another 16 in Phase 2.

Best of both worlds

Ocean cruising and golfing in Florida - all in the same week

s I teed it up at the spectacular Pete Dye course at PGA Golf Club in Florida it struck me how cool it was that less than 24 hours earlier I had been swimming in the crystal clear waters of The Bahamas, dancing with my wife in the moonlight on the deck of a cruise ship and enjoying a Las Vegas-style show.

This experience was made possible through a unique approach to a golf holiday - combining golf at the PGA Village in Port St. Lucie with a short ocean cruise to Freeport, Bahamas. The geography works well for this combo as Port St. Lucie is only a 45-minute drive from the Atlantic Coast port of Palm Beach where Bahamas Paradise Cruise Line operates two-night cruises to Freeport, Bahamas.

And Freeport is only 70 miles (112 kilometres) from Palm Beach so you can enjoy a slow cruise through the evening, on-ship entertainment and activity and wake up in The Bahamas.

It's a fantastic way to enjoy the best of both worlds. And with cruises starting at \$139 U.S. per person, it's also a very affordable way to try cruising for the first time without the commitment of a week at sea. The cruise line operates two ships - The Grand Celebration and the Grand Classica - so there are plenty of dates to pick for your golf-cruising vacation.

The Classica, built in 1991 and refurbished in 2014, has capacity for 1,680 passengers. The Grand Celebration, built in 1986 and refurbished in 2014 and 2017, can carry 1,900 passengers.

Although smaller by today's standards, the ships still have the amenities you need for a two-day cruise. We cruised first before playing three rounds of golf at PGA Village but you could do it the other way around - and that could be your best option if you're like me and your body cries for a break and some R & R after three consecutive rounds.

But don't get me wrong. We still had a great time cruising first. And maybe the relaxing nature of the cruise actually helped my back and allowed me to play three days in a row without any issues (other than a terrible short game).

If you're thinking about this cruise/golf option here's what you can expect. You can board the ship around noon on the day of departure so you can take full advantage of the onboard activities even before departure around 5:30 p.m.

Our ship was the Grand Celebration and one thing that struck me right from the start was just how friendly and helpful the staff were. That really helped make the experience enjoyable.

And so did the onboard amenities, which include two swimming pools, three Jacuzzis, full service spa and salon, fitness centre, casino, sports bar and 10 different dining options.

I can highly recommend the fine dining option after enjoying one of the best meals I've eaten in a long time as we sailed out to sea. The food and service were both outstanding and, with a spectacular view of the ocean, it was an unforgettable experience. It's an extra charge but it's sooo worth it!

After-dinner options include several lounges and the topnotch entertainment of a Vegas-style show in the 750-person Legends Grand Theatre. But you'll eventually want to grab some sleep because you'll be waking up in The Bahamas.

Our day in Freeport was the highlight of the trip, with the "Best of Grand Bahama Island" shore excursion giving us just the right amount of culture, sightseeing and relaxation. Stops included a souvenir and candle-making shop, the Rand Nature Centre National Park, Port Lucaya Marketplace and an exclusive Beach Club.

The beach experience was amazing with the beautiful white sand and calm and clear ocean creating a stunning setting.

It was hard to leave but when we did we had a few things to look forward to: more great food and entertainment on the ship. It turned out to be a beautiful moonlight night and as we cruised out to sea with the lights of Freeport dotting the horizon we danced on the ship's upper deck. It was all kind of romantic!

Then it was off to another excellent night of entertainment in the Grand Theatre (a different show than the previous night). By morning we were back in Port Palm Beach and ready for our next adventure - three rounds of golf at PGA Village and two nights at the Hilton Garden Inn.

It was my first visit to the PGA Golf Club, which is operated by the PGA of America, and have to admit I was a little awestruck. The clubhouse alone is worth the trip, with a PGA Gallery showcasing iconic trophies and artifacts from the past

100 years. I could have wandered around the gallery for hours but we had 54 holes of golf to play in three days so I only got a glimpse of this "mini hall of fame."

In addition to three courses designed by the legendary Tom Fazio and Pete Dye, the club has a state-of-the-art 35-acre PGA Learning Centre which is open for public use. It includes:

- More than 100 full-swing practice stations
- Five acres of private instruction & practice ground
- · Dedicated pitching and chipping practice & instruction areas
- 7,000 square-feet of USGA-certified putting greens
- Discover Golf Course a 3-hole teaching course
- A modern, full line equipped custom golf shop
- Equipment testing & fitting facility.

The first course we tackled was the Dye course, arguably the toughest of the three. It's highly playable from the right tees but you will get a real taste of what Dye is known for risk/reward holes.

While there's generally lots of room off the tee, you will also see a lot of sand - 126 bunkers in total. Some of these are strategically-placed traps in the fairway, forcing you to think hard about your next shot. And many are waste bunkers running along the edge of the fairway, creating a dramatic look.

The cool thing about the design is you are given options, including some split fairways. And if you're smart and execute well, the course will not eat you for breakfast.

Next up was the Wanamaker course designed by Fazio. The course is named after Rodman Wanamaker, who in 1916 inspired the birth of the PGA of America. It could be the prettiest of the three courses with some holes that are downright breathtaking.



The par 3 sixth hole is a stunner with elevated tees, water surrounding the green and bunkers protecting the front and back of the green. The par 4 8th hole is another beauty with water down the left side and a massive bunker in front of the green.

And the par 4 18th is a great finishing hole, a dogleg right with a pond down the right side all the way to the green. It usually requires a shot over water to get to the green and that's always a fun little challenge to end your round.

The third course is another Fazio design called the Ryder, named after Ryder Cup founder Samuel Ryder. It has a Carolina feel to it with majestic pine trees and pine straw rough and is known as the friendliest course, although you could not tell that from looking at my scorecard.

This course also includes probably my favourite hole of all three courses - the 4th, a gorgeous par 5 that plays about 420 yards from the standard tees. It's a dogleg right with a large

pond running all the way from in front of the tee box to the green. The more aggressive your line, the better your position for your second shot.

And at 420 yards, a gutsy tee shot over the water could put you in position to get on in two. So much strategy, so much fun!

Altogether, the three courses provide a superb variety of golf holes. All three have

been recognized on various "Top Courses in America" lists including Golf Digest's Top Public Courses in Florida. And the resort is rated by Golf Digest as one of the top 75 golf resorts in America.

The resort benefits from having incredibly friendly and accommodating staff who, among many other things, managed to keep smiles on their faces while rescuing our playing partners who mistakenly drove their power carts into the parking lot (the carts shut down automatically when this happens).

For the record, we did the same thing but managed to get ourselves out of the predicament on our own.

Five properties are available for Stay and Play and one I can recommend based on personal experience is the Hilton Garden Inn, a beautiful facility just minutes from the PGA Golf Club.

The lobby is spectacular, the outdoor pool has the warmest water I've experienced in a swimming pool, and the Sam Snead restaurant is located on the premises and is loaded with golf memorabilia.
