New management for National Pines

PurposefulGolf to take over in November 2024

PurposefulGolf has entered into a 21-year lease agreement to manage National Pines Golf Club near Barrie, effective November 2024. The announcement follows Purposeful's 2023 acquisition of The Ridge at Manitou in McKellar, Ont. National Pines will continue to operate as a private, member-based club, and Ridge at Manitou will transition into a member club incoming years.

"National Pines has a rich legacy as a great member club with a course that was long regarded as one of the best in the country," says Chris Gale, founder of Purposeful Group Ltd., the parent company of Purposeful Golf. "We are excited by the opportunity to manage this exceptional course and are pleased to be partnering with an ownership group who share our vision for the future."



Additional membership details for both National Pines and Ridge at Manitou will be provided in coming months. Both The Ridge at Manitou and National Pines were designed by award-winning Toronto-based golf course architect Thomas McBroom. National Pines opened in 1993 and was tested as the host venue for the 2007 and 2008 season-ending PGA Tour Canada Tour Championships.

The Toby Keith connection

Famous country singer had role in bringing together current owners of Ainsdale Golf Course near Kincardine. And he made their first date pretty spectacular.

Among the many people grieving the death of country singer/songwriter Toby Keith earlier this year were Charles and Taylor Candler, who own Ainsdale Golf Course near Kincardine.

The two of them had a special connection to Keith, one of the most successful country music artists of all time.

Shortly after Keith's death was announced, Taylor posted on Facebook a tribute to the man who she got to know during her time in Norman, Oklahoma.

She also agreed to share in a Q & A with Golf BruceGreySimcoe additional details about her connection with the country music legend including his role in her meeting her future husband Charles.

Q: Could you explain how you and Chuck met and what your role was with the women's golf team at that time?

A: In 2013 I was fortunate enough to be working with the OU (University of Oklahoma) women's golf team as a Graduate Assistant coach. During that year, I met Chuck out at Belmar Golf Club where he was working as the GM.

Q: I understand the university had a connection with the Belmar course. Was it used as a practice facility?

A: Yes, the University of Oklahoma used Belmar as one of our "home" golf courses for practice and play. We have an on-campus golf course as well, but in addition to that, we were fortunate enough to be out at Belmar as well. It's a beautiful track and practice facility.

Toby Keith, sir, I sure owe a lot to you. Not only were you one heck of a country music star but you were a phenomenal mentor. Some of you may not know, but Toby's golf course in Norman, OK is where @chuckster25 and I met. He was the GM and I was OU's grad assistant at the time. Had Toby & Trish not brought Chuck to Norman from Florida, we would never have met. Toby & Trish gave opportunities to Chuck to grow in his role and learn so much in the golf industry. Fast forward to today, we now have a course of our own with 3 young kids. Toby, thank you. Thank you for the memories, the best first date Chuck could ever pull off (thanks to Toby) and thank you for the endless music we will forever get to listen to. The world will miss you and we're comforted knowing you're no longer in pain. One heck of a fighter and one heck of a man. Rest easy Toby. Thoughts are with Trish, their family, & the Belmar family.

Q: I also understand Toby was a big Sooners fan and supporter of varsity golf. Can you provide a few more details about this?

A: Toby was a huge supporter of all of collegiate athletics, but especially the Sooners. He had a true passion for golf which made him close with both the men's and women's programs at OU. He was at so many football and basketball games, where you'd see him sitting courtside or standing on the field. He proudly sported the crimson & cream and every student athlete at OU knew how much Toby loved the Sooners.

Q: How closely did Toby work with Chuck and what was he like to work for?

A: (CHUCK): He was great to work for. He gave me the autonomy to be able to make decisions and run the business which I think is a great quality of an owner to have. He did a lot of juggling between his music and golf and family and all the other businesses he owned so it was good to be able to view that because that's what we do now (minus the music of course!)

Q: Can you provide a few more details on your famous first date with Chuck?

A: Our first date was one of my most favourite days - it was one of those "out of a movie" things! Chuck had asked me if I wanted to go to the horse races one Friday night. We went to Remington Park in OKC (Oklahoma City) to watch the races. Little did I

know, it was in Toby Keith's personal box...cheering for his horse. I was star struck when I walked out of the elevator and saw him standing there, all 6 ft. 3 inches of the country music legend. He said "Well hello there Miss Taylor" after Chuck introduced me. So we're watching the race and of course, his horse wins. Toby is fist pumping and raising his red solo cup! He invites everyone from the box down to the finish line to be in pictures with him and his horse. I was in disbelief. I remember texting my family like "OMG THIS ISN'T REAL!" Because of the big win, Toby invited those who wanted to go out to come to his restaurant in downtown OKC, Toby Keith's I Love This Bar & Grill (even though it was closing time!). Not thinking the night could possibly get any better but he grabs his guitar and heads up on stage for a mini private concert. I'll never forget this night, the way he made people feel not only through his music, but just by being the warm and inviting person that he was.

Q: How well did you get to know Toby and his wife Tricia during your time there?

A: We both got to know them very well, just in different ways. I got to know Toby through the

"playing" side of things, whereas Chuck obviously got to know them more so through work. Tricia was heavily involved in the Schooner Fall Classic collegiate golf tournament that OU hosted yearly at Belmar. She knew what the female golfers wanted to see, experience, and what would leave them with the "wow" factor when remembering the tournament each year. I got to experience that with her and watch her moves when I was working for OU as the grad assistant. She is very detail oriented and incredibly organized and

intelligent. Toby was sure to make you laugh whether it be on the course, with his guitar around the fire, or while he "hit a few nuggets" to get loose on the range.

Q: I heard Toby played to a 4 handicap. Did you ever get to play with him? He's got a song called Shitty Golfer. Is he being a little modest in the song or did he just write the song for the rest of us golfers?

A: Yes I had the privilege of playing with him. Chuck has a number of times as well. That song is accurate!!! He is a jokester, doesn't take himself too seriously, but would definitely try to improve his game. The song is definitely one that not only he relates to, but a lot of us golfers around the world.

Q: How often was Toby at the golf course?

A: He was at the golf course a lot. Obviously my time in Norman, OK was only from 2009-2014 so I didn't get to see him prior to then or after, but when I was there, I definitely saw him a lot. He did a phenomenal job of balancing his time and energy in MULTIPLE different areas of his life. His family was always #1 - which is something I admire maybe the most of all about him. He's this incredibly famous country music legend and multi-business owner, yet his family always remained #1. I relate to this so much with what we're doing here at Ainsdale. Obviously Chuck and I care so much about our business, but our family will always be #1 to us. You'd never ever want to hear us sing, so instead, crank Toby up loud and raise your red solo cup up for an absolutely legendary man.



Simcoe course closed

Major drain project forces Innisfil Creek Golf Club to permanently shut its doors

Some sad news out of Simcoe County as Innisfil Creek Golf Club in Cookstown announced earlier this year that it will be permanently closed.

Owner Nick Torkos says the closure is a result of the Town of Innisfil's ongoing South Innisfil Creek Drain reconstruction project. The purpose of the project is to reduce flooding in the Town of Innisfil, specifically in the surrounding area and including the golf course property.

Construction on the golf course property is to start in June, in the middle of the golf season, and would have shut down the course indefinitely. As well, the anticipated damage to holes 6, 9, 13 and 14, along with dirt excavations, would be cost-prohibitive for the course, Torkos said.

As part of the project, the course would be responsible for paying to tear down and replace four bridges on the course that run over the creek,

which will be widened by 30 feet and deepened by an additional three feet. Torkos estimates that cost at between \$1 million and \$1.5 million.

The town considers the project necessary and has been in talks with Torkos over the matter for several years.

The main municipal drain covers almost 10 kilometres, with a watershed of more than 80 square kilometres, and it collects runoff from about 800 properties in Innisfil and Bradford West Gwillimbury.

The golf course property has been a part of the Torkos family since 2004 when Nick's parents, Tom and Sophia, purchased it from the original owners.

It opened in 1997 and last year had 165 members and nearly 100 league players.

Q: Whose idea was it to create the customized shirts?

Dan Teeple decided we should get custom T-shirts and then it was a group effort between the 4 of us to decide on what should go on the back. The process of getting to the final numbers involved many ideas but we finally settled on the players' names and trying to have a significant number for each Canadian golfer.

Q: What kind of reaction did you get from Masters patrons?

A: The reaction was incredible. Given it was obvious we were Canadian we were stopped by many other Canadians who congratulated us on the great shirts and led to all kinds of great convercertainly a great conversation starter and we probably had at least a few dozen people want photos with us (or with

our shirts I should say)!

Q: What kind of reaction did you get from Weir and company? Did they make any comments about the shirts?

We met the 4 Canadian golfers on the 8th green.

We were waiting in the grandstand on the 8th hole as we knew they were coming up and a contingent of people commented that we had great shirts with a lady mentioning she loved our shirts but especially mine (I was wearing Taylor 72). After chatting with the people for a few minutes about where we were all from in Canada I was advised that the lady I was speaking with was Nick Taylor's mom and family. They were all wonderful people and we had a great talk with Nick's mom saying we needed to show the guys our shirts. Once we showed Nick and the guys our shirts, Nick tossed me the ball he was using, Conners and Hadwin gave thumbs up and Weir asked us if we were going to the Presidents Cup in Montreal? As they continued one of Mike Weir's friends who is a GM at a golf club in Ontario advised us we were getting free tickets to the Presidents Cup on condition that we cheered twice as loud. We said that would not be a problem.

Q: Tell me how Corey Conner's mother-inlaw ended up taking the photo?

A: After the interactions on the 8th hole we went to the 9th green to watch the Canadian golf group play hole 9. A member of our group, Joel Poechman (wearing 92 Conners) said you must be Corey Conners' mother-in-law as he could see the resemblance to Corey Conner's wife. She was super nice and got chatting with us. Being from the Listowel area we told her we were from Walkerton. When I mentioned my name, she asked if I was from Craig, McDonald Reddon Insurance Brokers as she was good friends with a work colleague of mine, Steve McConnell and his wife Julie. We had a great chat and while chatting she said she liked our shirts and we should get a picture with the guys. We said that would be great but she may have more pull than us getting them to stop as we did not want to bug the guys or know if it was appropriate to ask them to stop. Fortunately, she asked them to stop for a photo and it was Hadwin and Weir who were walking up first so she got them to stop and then Taylor and Conners came up and she orchestrated the photo that will be framed in all of our livingrooms. And she even had the good sense to make sure we lined up with each golfer matching the name on our shirts with each golfer. This all occurred just off the 9th green and it was fortunate as two of the golfers went in the clubhouse afterwards while two more went on to the back 9 to golf.

Q: Was it your first Masters and what did you and your friends think of the experience?

A: For two of us, Dan Teeple and myself, it was our first Masters experience. Joel and Corey Poechman had been once previously. The experience was incredible and hard to put into

words. You know it is spectacular and magical seeing it on TV but it is even more incredible in person. It really is hard to explain and something if you're fortunate enough you just have to experience. The beauty of the course is surreal. We also found TV does not do justice to the beauty but also to the elevation changes and the fact that there are no flat lies on the course. You gain a new appreciation not just for the beauty of the course but the difficulty. I would still like the opportunity to play it even though I am confident it would be a dishonest 120 on the scorecard!!

Q: It seemed like your photo got a lot of attention on social media. Did you get much reaction from friends or others as a result of this?

A: Yes, there was a lot of disbelief or more asking how did that happen. There were lots of positive comments on the great shirts – we laugh and say it was probably the best \$16 we ever spent! The reaction has been to want to hear the story of how the photo came to be and we get lots of advice that we need to get that photo framed, which we are all doing!

Q: Do all four of you play out of Walkerton **Golf and Curling Club?**

A: Three of the four of us are members at the Walkerton Golf & Curling Club as we live in Walkerton or surrounding area. Corey is from Walkerton but now lives in the Kitchener-Waterloo area so he golfs down in that area. We all love golf and get out whenever our schedules allow. We try to make Thursday Men's Night a regular part of our summer routine and any other time I am not being a taxi driver for my kids or working!

Championships coming to BGS

This is going to be a big year for golf in BruceGreySimcoe.

Three provincial championships and one Canadian championship are scheduled to be played at courses in the region.

The fun kicks off with the Champion of Champions event on May 14 at The Club at Bond Head.

This event will played on the North and South courses at Bond Head and will feature club champions in all divisions – Men's, Senior Men's, Women's, Senior Women's, Junior Boys and Junior Girls.

Next up will be the Ontario Senior Women's Championship at The Golf Club at Lora Bay, which is set for Aug. 6-8 at the Thornbury-area course (pictured here).

A third provincial championship – the Ontario Public Amateur Championship for men and women – is set for Aug. 29-30 at Tangle Creek Golf & Country Club.

The national event – the Canadian Senior Men's Championship – will take place Sept. 11-15 at Saugeen Golf Club near Port Elgin.

Much is planned for this event, which will feature most of the best senior golfers in the country as well as some from other countries (See next page for more)

In addition to the championships, these qualifiers for provincial events are scheduled for BGS courses.

Sept. 17 – The Nest at Friday Harbour for Men's and Senior Men's Better Ball Championship.

What to Expect: Competitors will be among the best senior golfers in Canada, Great Britain and the U.S.

What local organizers have planned: Golf Fest is a Thursday-Sunday event featuring a huge tent in the front parking lot housing interactive games, a golf simulator, sponsor displays, beer garden and silent auction. Outside there will be disc golf, putting, chipping and hole-in-one contests. The tent will feature ongoing live entertainment including the 18-piece Canadian Big Band on Friday evening. Committee chair Ken Dunlop expects 500 to 1,000 people per day.

Around the Clubs

Ainsdale

The Kincardine-area course has completed all continuous gravel cart paths on the front 9 and work has begun on #10. They are hoping to get all of the back 9 done this year. The course had no cart paths when Taylor and Charles Candler took over in 2017.

Northern Dunes

The Hepworth-area course wintered well and was open in March. GM Clark Hepburn says there are plans to build new tee boxes between the reds and the white tees which will give golfers a total distance of around 5,500 yards. Also in the works is a plan to introduce an indoor golf simulator this winter. It will be installed in the restaurant area and plans are to keep the restaurant open to serve golfers all year round.

South Port

The Port Elgin-area 9-holer wintered very well and the course is happy to have Superintendent Scott Maue and his staff back. New this year is chef Hailey Ashton. The club is working on updated menus and a return to the popular buffet nights. Renovations include clubhouse flooring improvements and a patio extension.

Monterra Golf


Monterra is celebrating its 35 anniversary this year. The development of this championship course took more than 10 years of planning and over \$3 million to complete. Designed by Tom McBroom, it opened in 1989. Monterra is holding the RBC **PGA Scramble qualifier on** Thursday, July 25, 2024. Cranberry Golf Course

The Cranberry Golf Course at Living Water Resorts in Collingwood is undergoing a "refresh" to be launched in July. The refresh features an 18-hole par 71 course with yardage remaining over 6,000+ yards. The key changes will occur around mid-July and will involve reconfiguration of several holes including the conversion of the 19th hole into the 18th hole. General Manager Errol Smith said the investment in the refresh and course enhancements are designed to deliver what Cranberry's golfers value: "Less time, more fun." "Working with Canadian golf course designer David Moote over the past two years, the changes to the course will continue to provide a balance between a true test of golf skills and expansive fairways for the rest of us," Errol said.

Vespra Hills Golf Club

The Barrie-area club is now a member of the ClubLink organization. The club, established in 2003, is in Springwater Township, just 10 minutes from downtown Barrie. The 27-hole private club will be a fully integrated, Gold-level Member Club managed by ClubLink. Membership in ClubLink gives access to 44, 18-hole equivalent championship and 2, 18-hole equivalent academy courses, at 34 locations in two separate geographical Regions - Ontario/Quebec (including two managed properties) and Florida.

What was happening 20 years ago:


- Cobble Beach Golf Links and The Raven at Lora Bay were both under construction.

Meet the Pro

Glen Barnett

Sauble Beach resident is teaching pro at Pinewoods Golf

Q: When and how did you get started in golf and was there a particular person who helped with your introduction to the game?

A: My dad played a pivotal role in introducing me to the game of golf. From my earliest memories, he would take me along to the course, patiently teaching me the

fundamentals and sharing his passion for the sport. His guidance, encouragement, and countless rounds together not only taught me how to swing a club but instilled in me a love for the game that has lasted a lifetime.

Q: Where did you play as a youngster, and did you compete in junior events?

A: When I was 8 years old my parents got me a membership at the course up the street from our house, Streetsville Glen G.C. For many years during the



summer my dad would drop me off at the course at 6 a.m. to be first off the tee, then would return to pick me up at dinner time as I was ending my 3rd round! While I didn't compete extensively in junior events, I did participate in many local tournaments, which provided valuable experiences and the opportunity to play at some exclusive golf courses which also helped me refine my skills on the course.

Q: At what point did you decide to become a golf professional and what steps did you take to make that happen?

A: The decision to pursue a career as a golf professional was a culmination of my passion for the game and the desire to immerse myself in the wonderful world of golf. It was a gradual realization rather than a single moment. I think countless hours on the range. I sought out reputable coaches and mentors who helped me finetune my skills and provided the necessary tools to become a successful instructor. I earned my licence with the CGTF (Canadian Golf Teachers Federation) and CGPA (Canadian Golf Psychology Association) in 2021. I am constantly refining my technique and mental approach to the game to provide high quality instruction.

Q: What was your first job in the golf industry and where else have you worked as a golf professional?

A: My first job in the golf industry was working in the back shop at Streetsville Glen, where I cleaned and re-gripped members' clubs, and had a blast in the tractor picking up range balls. It was a hands-on introduction to the inner workings of a golf facility. Prior to moving to Sauble Beach year-round, I worked my day job (condo renovation business in Toronto's Harbourfront) and taught evening and weekend lessons in Toronto at the Centennial Park Golf Course.

Q: What led to your decision to provide golf instruction out of Pinewoods?

A: The decision to run my business golfready.ca out of Pinewoods Golf at Sauble Beach stemmed from a combination of factors that aligned with my career aspirations and personal values. We bought our home in Sauble in 2019 and moved up full time in 2022. Since then I am full time, year round into golf, even with Rotary. I am spearheading a new fundraising golf tournament being held at Pinewoods this Sept 8.

Q: What's your role at the golf course and how much of your time is spent teaching?

Celebration of Life


For Legacy Ridge member John Garvey


John was also well known for his work as an Owen Sound-area umpire and hockey referee for many years. He died Feb. 21, 2024 at age 100.
